Using a Kelly kettle	Adult/Children	Scald Severe burn	High	 Use fire gloves when moving Kelly kettle, carry by handle Put fuel through the top chimney by keeping hands to one side of the opening, resting the sticks on the edge of the chimney and letting the stick fall in Do not overfill Check Kelly kettle before use to ensure undamaged Place on a flat and stable surface Ensure bung is in to transfer Pour using handle and chain for bung Follow fire safety as above.
